

1. Saghi Ahmadi – Age 23

Learning knowledge in school is one thing, but applying the things that you learn in school in a real world setting is another challenge. Saghi is in her 4th year at KPU's Bachelor of Business Administration program in Entrepreneurial Leadership. Not only is she one of the top academic performers in school, she has successfully applied her academic knowledge in business solutions by administering projects with local H&M stores, Surrey Metro Taxi and Plan Canada. She is a lead trainer for MAC Marketing Solutions initiating corporate process enhancement. Her work resulted in significant improvements in system review, supply chain, and contract review for her clients. In 2015, she was nominated for the company's Spirit Award for embodying the organization's core values of fun, teamwork, and excellence.

2. Sukhman Bajwa – Age 16

You can always start your own movement when you set your mind to it. Sukhman is a founder of Unified 4 Change, a non-profit organization that supports many local charities through partnerships. Every week, they provide support at a homeless shelter in Surrey and hold an annual basketball tournament for hundreds of students to raise funds for cancer and other medical research. Unified 4 Change has even expanded to UBC and SFU. Sukhman is also a Youth Executive Director at SOAR Philanthropic Society. SOAR provides financial assistance to graduating high school students wishing to attend post-secondary institutions and inspires them to realize their potential. He oversees all operations involving high school students across the Lower Mainland. Sukhman is currently a Grade 11 student at Tamanawis Secondary School and has an average close to 100%. He hopes to study science and earn a joint degree with a Doctor of Medicine and MBA one day.

3. Dylan Belvedere – Age 23

True innovation brings people together. Dylan is a founder and director of Maker Cube, Surrey's first and only makerspace location, providing workplace tools for innovators at a low cost. Maker Cube is Surrey's main technical, innovating and inventing space, and it is a hub for people passionate about science, technology, design, and making. Dylan was one of two students from SFU selected for Huawei Mobile's Seeds of the Future program in China. For 3 years in a row, he was elected as a Vice-President of SFU Surrey's Mechatronic Systems Engineering Students Society. He also placed first in SFU's Engineering Competition in 2013 and 2014. Dylan perfectly demonstrates the kind of young, high-tech, entrepreneurial spirit of Surrey's economic and environmentally sustainable future.

4. Thomas Bogucki – Age 21

Empowering disadvantaged youth with education is an ultimate solution to end the cycles of economic and social challenges. Thomas is a Program manager for SFU Enactus' Count on Me. This new program tries to combat the high rates of financial illiteracy and lack of employability skills in the at-risk youth demographic. Over the course of six weeks, it covers the topics of goal setting and budgeting, resumes and cover letters, banking & saving and credit, income & taxes, and job interviews. During this year, Count on Me, led by Thomas has successfully increased their financial assets of 41 participants by a total of \$18,263. In the 2016 Enactus Western Regional Exposition, Count on Me program finished first in the financial literacy category and won an Impact Award among youth empowerment category. In academics, Thomas has been recognized on the Dean's Honor Roll in 2014 and 2015, and he recently came in second place at the Ace the Case Competition at KPMG Vancouver.

5. Taylor Byrom – Age 25

Taylor Byrom is the owner of "Taylor Hart Designs", an adaptive clothing company developed for children with complex medical needs. Using special fabrics and designs, their clothing is designed to be functional for children with feeding tubes, tracheotomy tubes, wheelchair dependency and sensory processing disorders. A 2013 graduate from KPU's Fashion & Technology degree program at the Wilson School of Design, she embodies the essence of what KPU hopes for its graduates. Taylor recently hosted her first Wilson School of Design student intern, and was invited as a guest speaker at 2016 Wilson School Convocation Ceremony. Her vision, empathy, and compassion for children with complex medical needs drives her to build a prosperous company based on integrity, innovation and human-centered design.

6. Jaspreet Dayal – Age 25

Jaspreet founded Knightridge Development in October 2013 and since has been responsible for a number of real estate development projects ranging from single family homes to high-end residential subdivisions with an estimated value of \$9.8 million. In addition to running a thriving business, he is also a full-time intern architectural technologist at Apex Design Group, a design firm specializing in residential and commercial design. At Apex, he leads the company's consulting division and coordinates engineers, interior designers, contactors and other professionals on commercial projects. He holds a diploma in Architectural Building and Engineering Technology from BCIT and is working towards becoming a registered architect. His ability to lead a growing company while maintaining a full time job and keeping up with his studies shows tremendous work ethic, leadership and resilience.

7. Sukhjiven Gill – Age 22

It takes great dedication to study abroad while staying at the top of your graduating class. Sukhjiven is an international student from India. She just graduated from KPU's Bachelor of Business Administration in Accounting and earned the Dean's Honor Roll and Distinction status in April 2016. As a volunteer, she committed over 6 months to work with a team of KPU students and faculty coaches to prepare for case competitions. She was chosen in a team of top 3 students to compete in a Chartered Professional Accountants Case Competition, Case IT International Management Information Systems Case Competition, and Singapore Apex Biz-IT Global Case Challenge in 2015. This involvement in co-op programs paved her way to land a full-time accounting position at MNP LLP. In September, she will be in a Chartered Professional Accountant program, working towards earning a CPA designation by 2018.

8. Jerry Gunadasa – Age 22

When you are heading down a wrong path, sometimes it only takes one person who can guide you to make better choices. Jerry is exactly that person who offers this support. In 2015, Surrey Crime Prevention Society volunteers contributed close to 30,000 hours towards the enhancement of community safety in the City of Surrey, and Jerry was a critical part of this success. He demonstrated exceptional leadership as a volunteer, going above and beyond in his duties and participating in the Community Safety Youth Leadership & Mentorship Program as a mentor. He has been working with youth-at-risk since May 2015. The mentees that Jerry has been nurturing have successfully completed their commitment with the program, and have become productive members of Surrey's community. Through this peer-to-peer role, Jerry influences these young people into choosing a positive path, encouraging them to re-evaluate their life choices.

9. Baqar Hassan – Age 23

Regardless of your origin and nationality, with bright ideas and extraordinary effort, you can make anything happen in Canada. Baqar is a recent graduate from SFU who is currently working with ePione Technologies. The company manages pharmaceutical consumption by elderly patients, monitoring the dispensing of medications and reporting results to medical professionals. Baqar is one of the founders and his role is to develop the market and respond to customers needs from both the patient and medical professionals. As an international student from Pakistan while he was at SFU, Baqar served as Vice-President External and Public Relations Officer for the Pakistan Student Association. He stayed true to his origin and helped to raise over \$10,000 to support local Pakistani community. In 2014, he also raised over \$28,000 for Canadian Cancer research. He exemplifies the new generation of Canadians.

10. Hebah Arsheen Hussaina – Age 17

Bridging a gap between community and non-profit organizations is a critical determinant in the success of every charity group. Hebah has been involved with the Surrey Hospital and Outpatient Centre Foundation since 2009 as a volunteer. Hebah realized that the Foundation, which raises funds for health facilities serving 1.8 million people, was missing an opportunity to connect youth in the community. She developed a comprehensive business plan and operational calendar for a sustaining, youth driven organization called, 'Youth for CARE,' which supports the Foundation while engaging youth in the Surrey. The unit inspires and actively involves youth in fundraisers supporting the hospital, awareness campaigns and other volunteer initiatives relating to the hospital. Youth for CARE has donated over \$2700 in support and with over 100 members from 16 different schools. The group continues to expand and make a huge impact on the foundation through outstanding volunteer activities.

11. Leejoo Hwang – Age 17

Community planning is easier than a lot of people might think.

Leejoo runs a club in Fraser Heights Secondary called the, Local Development Club, where they focus on improving neighborhoods by initiating changes and engaging with local citizens in the community. The Club is currently working on maintaining a start-up garden and a Little Free Library to host a gathering place for like-minded people in the city. He sits on the Resident Advisory Committee for the Surrey School District as part of the Vancouver Foundation. He also takes part in Surrey Leadership Youth Council and Model United Nations Conference, assisting with youth workshops and fundraisers. He also works with Evergreen and organizes 100 in 1 Day, a nation-wide event with a focus on urban interventions and community building. Recently, Leejoo won the Young Investors Case Competition.

12. Bal Khatra – Age 24

Making a difference in your community at your work could be the most satisfying factors in your career. Bal plays an integral role at Coast Capital Savings as a member of the credit union's corporate university: Coast U. Bal is responsible for training Coast Capital Savings' employees and supporting the company's community initiatives and learning programs, such as the 'Youth Get It' grant program which so far donated \$1.2 Million to 87 different community organizations. He supports new employees and provides vital on-boarding programs as they navigate their positions with Coast Capital. Prior to joining Coast Capital, he was the Vice-President of the SFU Human Resources Student Association, overseeing a strategic plan that increased on-campus engagement amongst HR students and communicated opportunities in the industry. Bal volunteers as a Workshop Facilitator with Junior Achievement of BC's 'Dollar with Sense' and 'Economics for Success' programs, which support the development of financial literacy skills for youth.

13. Renee Lang – Age 20

By giving an opportunity for youth to run a business, you unleash a whole new entrepreneurial potential for the next generation. Renee is involved with Enactus SFU's Bright Ideas program, which gives youth a chance to pursue their own entrepreneurial ideas. Students are provided a micro-loan to support their own businesses and sell to the community. Through Renee's guidance as the external manager, Bright Ideas provides participants an engaging experience while learning fundamental business knowledge. Renee plays a vital role in the executive team, responsible for researching and connecting with potential sponsors and stakeholders that share a similar vision for the club. Time and time again, she has proven herself by maintaining great relationships with sponsors by securing various in-kind and monetary supports to successfully implement Enactus programs. Renee also volunteers for the City of Surrey and sits on the Board of Directors for the Illuminate Vancouver Conference.

14. Julius Michael – Age 21

Technology based on empathy and inclusiveness changes lives of the less advantaged demographic in our society. Orello Hearing Technology is a hearing aid startup co-founded by Entrepreneurship and Mechatronic students at SFU Surrey in the Technology Entrepreneurship Program. The student team is dedicated to innovating an in-ear self-custom fitted hearing aid uniquely designed for the needs of the developing world. The hearing aid allows for custom fitting and tuning adjustments without the need of a specialist. Julius is a co-founder of Orello Hearing Technology. With his knowledge and skills in entrepreneurship and innovation, he assisted Orello in winning first place in the Most Impactful Solution at SFU Surrey's Opportunity Fest 2016. Julius is passionate about motivating others to be their best and inspires his teammates at Orello to play to their strengths and motivates them to achieve their maximum potential.

15. Kevin Nan – Age 17

In June 2014, Kevin founded Surrey Model United Nations with the goal to create a high-quality, affordable conference for Lower Mainland youth to tackle social justice and philanthropic efforts. He put up over \$1000 of his own money as start-up capital for the conference and ultimately the team brought together over 125 delegates at the inaugural session, bringing youth together to take on global initiatives. Kevin is a passionate agent for social change. Kevin facilitated the collection, transportation, delivery and follow-up of 5 international shipments, sending over 20,000 books and other educational materials to build libraries in Uganda, Kenya, Papua New Guinea, Philippines, and NGO camps that serve the Yazidi minority population in Lalish and Doluk, Iraq as well as Syria. Kevin also served as the Finance Director for the MiniEnterprize 2016 Conference, guiding youth in finance, personal branding, entrepreneurship and a case competition.

16. Ethan O'Brien – Age 23

Agricultural technology enables us to rethink how we grow our food. As a member of the 2015 Grenoble x SFU semester in Environmental and Sustainable Entrepreneurship, Ethan came up with the idea of a local food company that utilizes new vertical farming technology to produce food year-round. He designed and built a vertical farming system inside a greenhouse he had built at his parent's farm, and founded the 'Living Garden Foods Corporation' to grow vegetables and herbs to sell at the Surrey Urban Farmers Market. The business, with their recirculating hydroponic farming system, uses 90% less water than traditional field agriculture, and can profitably grow food indoors

365 days of the year in any climate, from Saharan heat to Arctic cold. His business won the Grand Prize at SFU's Opportunity Fest and it was featured in SFU News and Business in Vancouver. Ethan also received the Charles Chang Award for Student Entrepreneurship and the RBC Undergraduate Entrepreneurship and Innovation Award. He and his business partners have attended five tradeshow and presented on stage at the Fraser Valley Food Show and VegExpo to show people without access to land how to grow their own food on any wall surface outside or indoors.

17. Raveena Oberoi – Age 22

At the age of 17, Raveena realized her passion in baking and made it into a small venture, 'Just Cakes'. A few years later, 'Just Cakes' is one of the largest and most well known professional pastry and cake businesses in the Lower Mainland. Many local restaurants and large distribution firms have recently started purchasing Raveena's top products. She established a charity division that periodically donates a portion of profits to local charitable organizations across the Lower Mainland. At university, she was recognized as one of the top 15% students with a 3.8 GPA and was awarded a top student and leader by the Golden Key Honors Society for her outstanding work at school and in the community. She has had the opportunity to speak at many large leadership conferences, including at the Young Women in Business conference, where she was recognized as a leading female entrepreneur in the Lower Mainland. She was also recently selected to be on Dragon's Den to pitch her business and getting a large investor involved with 'Just Cakes'.

18. Cecillia Pang – Age 17

Cecilia's love for empowerment and art resulted in the creation of a city program called Art2heart. The program holds weekly meetings and artistic events to foster the talents of Surrey's youth in arts. With the mission to unlock potential in youth across the city and increase artistic opportunities for young artists, the program successfully held events with Surrey Steps Up and Surrey Leadership Action Conference.

Cecilia was named as Canada's Top 20 Under 20 in 2015 for her humanitarian work through Free the Children and Rotary International. Her outstanding leadership and volunteering in the community led her to receive the Service Above Self Surrey Youth Leadership Award in 2015 and the Good Deed Award 2013/14.

19. Tina Peng – Age 25

Tina joined the Surrey City Development Corporation (otherwise known as SCDC) in July of 2014 and is the Senior Development Analyst, assisting the City of Surrey in transforming Surrey into a modern, vibrant and inclusive community. She established strong partnerships with community stakeholders and developers to facilitate a wide range of investments and developments. She currently sits on the Events Committee for CREW (Commercial Real Estate Women), a group that supports the development and advancement of women in the commercial real estate industry. She is also on the Marketing Committee for Downtown Surrey Business Improvement Association. Graduating from UBC's Sauder School of Business in 2012, she recently earned the Chartered Financial Analyst designation. With her real estate market knowledge and financial strength, along with her leadership and problem solving skills, Tina is a valued team member and is a key representative of SCDC.

20. Atif Saad – Age 23

What is a business without social media nowadays? Atif is a co-founder of a Surrey-based digital marketing agency, ORTANGO. The company focuses on helping small/medium sized businesses with social media, website design and search engine marketing. Since its launch in June 2015, ORTANGO garnered sponsorship from Self Employment & Entrepreneur Development Society and has successfully delivered over 30 projects. Atif was also a Hunger Awareness National Champion at Ace Nationals in Calgary for his work with Enactus SFU's project, "Let's Can Hunger." He also co-founded SFU's largest event social page, "The Schedule SFU" which helps students find out about events happening around the campus. He was the head of sponsorship for SFU Student Society's 2015 Fall Kickoff Event, and was able to bring \$42,000 in both monetary and in-kind sponsorship.

21. Amit Sandhu – Age 21

Every business needs communication channels that connect your venture to consumers. Amit is a founder and a CEO of 'EasyWeb Solutions', a marketing agency that provides services such as website development, digital marketing, and content management. Remarkably, all the skills that he needed to launch the business, such as HTML, CSS, and other website coding skills were all self-taught. EasyWeb perfectly reflects Amit's extraordinary character towards learning, risk-taking and success. Amit is an Economics student at SFU, and is actively involved with the Finance Student Society.

22. Pratap Sandhu – Age 21

Pratap Sandhu is currently a Marketing Director at 'Prabu Foods', a family-owned venture that has expanded from a small retail sweet shop into a 9,000 square foot Canadian Food Inspection Agency and U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved facility in Surrey.

The company provides frozen ethnic products to Save On Foods, Buy-Low Foods and is currently in talk with Loblaws and Wal-Mart. Pratap played a critical role in this expansion, as it was his idea to sell his family's products in a retail space and expand the market further to give consumers a taste of ethnic Indian food. Pratap is also a Junior Director of "the Pacific Club" in Vancouver, an organization that gives young business professionals an opportunity to connect and learn from industry leaders. He is the youngest individual on the board and has successfully hosted conferences that featured business leaders like Chip Wilson and Vikram Vij. He is currently completing his Marketing Diploma at BCIT School of Business and is preparing for his Masters in Business Administration at the University of Liverpool.

23. Jeevanjot Sethi – Age 17

Being an active global ambassador starts at your doorstep. Jeevanjot is the founder of the 'Panorama Ridge Global Initiative', which is a

non-profit organization raising awareness for global issues among youth in Surrey. He founded the organization when he was inspired to take a stand for the on-going Syrian crisis. Alongside a group of 10 volunteers, he decided to engage in a fundraising bottle drive to make a small difference for large-scale global issues. After the success of this event, the group decided to continue their pursuit to raise awareness of humanitarian crises. For his project in Guatemala to construct community housing, he raised over \$10,000. He mentored volunteers on how to make business presentations for the project and provided guidance in canvassing donations from local Surrey businesses. Upon graduation, he intends to incorporate his interest of science and altruism into a professional career, aspiring to be employed by Doctors Without Borders.
